

Year 6 Home Learning Grid - Autumn 2



Choose one home learning activity to complete each week. You can choose which one to do and in which order you do them. Homework books will be taken in on a Monday so they can be marked, and will be given back out on Tuesday. Homework club will be during Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes, where children will have access to laptops and the Internet. For when you have a busy week at home, we have included a Family Week. All activities should be completed in your homework book to the best of your ability, using your best presentation. <p><u>Mathematical</u> Create a maths glossary in your homework books. Include these words:</p> <p>Fraction, decimal, percentage, equivalent, simplify, numerator, denominator, whole number, length, weight, capacity, unit of measurement, convert, compare, order.</p> <p>You can use a dictionary to help you if you need to, but please don't copy out the dictionary! Use maths examples/ diagrams in your glossary if you would like.</p>	<p><u>Social</u> Write a letter to a Monarch (either current or historical). Ask them about their life, and compare it to yours. Try to ask interesting questions, such as 'advantages and disadvantages of being a monarch, or 'what was the most noteworthy event during your reign?' rather than 'what is your favourite food?'</p> <p>Try to show off your knowledge of monarchs so far through the questions you ask.</p> <p>You should present your work as if it were a letter than was really going to be sent - you could even find a royal address to make your letter look more realistic!</p>	<p><u>Written</u> Write a short story which is set in the past. You can decide when in history you want your story to be, what characters you want to include and what the storyline is about.</p> <p>Your story should have a beginning, middle and end and should include all the non-negotiables of Literacy:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - A range of punctuation - Carefully chosen vocabulary - Paragraphs - A range of different sentence lengths - Speech between characters - Consistent spelling - Fluent, legible handwriting
<p><u>Research/ Creative</u> Research a Royal portrait of a monarch or a portrait artist. You can present your findings in the following ways:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Write about what you have found out in a non-fiction text style - Create a PowerPoint - Re-create one of the pieces of art (you could draw/ paint/ use a computer/ sketch) - A combination of the above 	<p><u>Linguistic (Language)</u> Find a poem you enjoyed reading. Copy the poem into your homework book using your best handwriting. Illustrate the poem if you would like. Answer these questions about the poem:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Does the poem rhyme? What is the pattern? 2) What is the poem about? 3) Is there a moral/ message in the poem? 4) Where/ when is the poem set? 5) Is there any alliteration/ simile/ repetition/ metaphor/ portmanteaux/ onomatopoeia? 6) Why did you choose the poem? <p>Answer the questions in full sentences in your book.</p>	<p>Family Week - For when you have a busy weekend.</p> <p>This is free for when you have something special planned for a weekend, or just feel like relaxing!
